Congratulations again to our Andrew Hunter Award winner, Alyssa. It will be fun to hear her present in September at our open meeting. Enjoy your summer!


Wasaga Under Siege - A War of 1812 Experience

Wasaga under Siege "A War of 1812 Experience" hosted by Nancy Island Historic Site and the Town of Wasaga Beach will feature authentic War of 1812 tactics, historical battles, marine assault landings, artillery, and much more. A professional public address announcer will narrate each battle event as a series of fictional and historical battle scenarios will be presented to the public over a three day period.



The Grand Encampment at Nancy Island Historic Site will feature over 400 reenactors opening their living history

Wasaga Under Siege - continued

According to Bonnie Smith of the Town of Wasaga Beach, "The sandy beach and the modern attractions that surround it have overshadowed Wasaga Beaches rich history for such a long time, that only a small percentage of visitors and residents actually know that a War of 1812 battle was fought here. Wasaga under Siege "A War of 1812 Experience" is an annual large scale reenactment that will help bring to live this important historical event in Wasaga Beaches' history.

Bonnie also emphasized that "Battles and activities will no longer be restricted to the Historic Site of Nancy Island as all battle events will take place off the island in various beach park locations throughout Wasaga Beach. The battles taking place off Nancy Island will bring more awareness of our rich history to our visitors and residents as well as bringing more exposure and visitation to Nancy Island Historic Site itself."

As well, this year, a re-enactment of the Relief of Fort Mackinac in 1814 will take place on the Nottawasaga River from Edenvale, ON (Glengarry Landing) to the mouth of the Nottawasaga River (Nancy Island Historic Site). This 25-30 km River Run will begin on Friday, July 22 starting at 9:00am to 1:00pm from Edenvale to Jacks Lake then conclude on Saturday, July 23 starting at 9:00am to 1:00pm from Jacks Lake to Nancy Island.

The re-enactment of a portion of the Relief of Fort Mackinac, which took place from February to April 1814 is a wonderful addition to the list of activities taking place in 2011.

The Upper Nottawasaga River is basically the same way it looked like in 1814 and is a great opportunity for those hearty re-enactors to experience the environment and hardships soldiers and sailors experienced firsthand on this historical journey. This river excursion will not be a leisurely float down the

river as all participants will be expected to pull their weight on an oar, potentially cut paths through fallen trees and log jams and getting your feet wet as low fast running water may dictate guiding the boat by hand and feet.

The following is a schedule of the variety of battles will be waged:

Skirmish in the Woods!

Friday, July 22, 7:00pm – Fictional Battle

American scouting and foraging parties have been sent ashore for firewood and reconnaissance in search of any signs of British forces and the Schooner Nancy hidden up the Nottawasaga River. British pickets have already alerted Lt. Worsley of the American presence and re-enforcements have been sent out to stop the American advance and hopefully discovering the Nancy.

The Americans have Landed!

Saturday, July 23, 2:00pm - Fictional Battle

The Americans, unprepared for the previous evening battle, have regrouped and landed with force as they come closer and closer to detecting H.M.S. Nancy. Once again Lt. Worsley and his small force will try and hold off the Americans and avoid detection. Will they succeed?

Defending H.M.S. Nancy!

Saturday, July 23, 7:00pm – Historical Battle

Having successfully staled the American advance hours earlier and believing that the Nancy's hiding place is still safe, Lt. Worsley was unaware that the tall masts of his ship had been spotted by American troops during the day battle and a full scale American assault was being planned to capture his ship. Lt. Worsley did all he could to defend her from the American onslaught. Badly outnumbered the Nancy was destroyed in battle, though its defenders escaped upstream to fight another day.

Avenging the Nancy!

Sunday, July 24, 2:00pm – Fictional Battle

The Americans, having obtained their objective in destroying the Nancy, have left behind two small ships and crew to guard the mouth of the Nottawasaga River. Lt. Worsley having re-supplied rowboats with goods and ammunition from an upstream depot must first clear the way for his rowboats to safely pass re-supply besieged and Michilimackinac. Forcing the Americans to once again land and fight, Lt. Worsley will have the final taste of victory as British cold steel and Native support save the day!

If all this Siege activity makes you thirsty, the ladies and gentlemen of the Nancy Island Historic Site Grand Encampment are invited to take tea on Saturday, July 23 at 3:15 p.m. in the hospitality tent hosted by the ladies of the Incorporated Militia of Upper Canada. Please bring your own tea cup, plate, spoon and chair.

To satisfy the appetites of our guests, we shall be serving treats from the Georgian Period, baked by the finest camp followers of the Incorporated Militia of Upper Canada. The afternoon will also include a formal presentation on a selected topic.

Huronia Historical Parks

Sainte-Marie among the Hurons and Discovery Harbour anticipate a strong Tourism season this year, and welcome visitors from Ontario, the rest of Canada, and around the world to the Southern Georgian Bay area. "Our historical attractions welcomed visitors from over 70 countries last year, and along with the diversity of our primary market, the Greater Toronto area, we've enhanced a number of visitor services", said General Manager Jan Gray. example is the Audio Wand Tours, available in 12 languages that also improve accessibility for visitors with visual disabilities", she noted.

New bilingual websites have been launched for both historic sites featuring easy navigation and many special features. Users will find informative and interactive sections including Plan Your Visit, Special Events, School Visits, and Group Visits. The websites also include fun children's games, a Media Corner for journalists complete with Resource Kit, and a Flicker photo gallery with high quality images. Welcome messages in 12 languages will also stimulate visits to the attractions.

Many Special Events and Highlights are planned for both sites throughout

2011. A new feature exhibit is entitled "The Jesuits in North America: Celebrating 400 Years".

The exhibit chronicles the Jesuits' presence in North America including their arrival at Port Royal in Acadia 1611, the founding of Sainte-Marie among the Hurons in 1639, and the Jesuits' continuing work as teachers and missionaries throughout the world.

Sainte-Marie celebrated National Aboriginal Day on June 21 featuring special free-flow programming for both school groups and the public, and the dynamic Aboriginal Festival Weekend ran June 25-26 showcasing First Nations drumming, singing, and dancing.

Franco-Ontarian Day on September 25 celebrates the Francophone community in Ontario, and the popular Thanksgiving Harvest Festival and Arts and Crafts Show and Sale returns to Sainte-Marie October 8-9. A "Top 100" event in Ontario for three years running, the spectacular "First Light" Christmas event at Sainte-Marie will be presented during the evenings of November 24-25-26.

Discovery Harbour will host a Citizenship Ceremony on July 12 and admission will be FREE that day! A special musical highlight called "Ditties and Shanties" is planned for July 23 featuring presentations of historically themed music throughout the historic site. Métis Day Bo'jou Neejee returns August 6. Haunted Harbour, a fun and spooky outing for the entire family, expands to three evenings October 26-27-28 due to popular demand.

Both sites will offer enhanced family programming throughout the summer season. At Sainte-Marie, a fun new Scavenger Hunt activity will be introduced throughout the historic site. An expanded on-site music program is also planned, plus special French cooking and French Fairy Tales themed weekends on selected dates. Discovery Harbour will have a daily croquet activity, on-deck activities aboard the impressive historic replica ships H.M.S. Tecumseth and Bee, dockyard demonstrations including an all-new sawpit, sailor's ropework, and 19th century cooking. New special displays focusing on historic gardens will be in the site's North Visitor Centre.

Sum of Arts and Culture

What is Sumac?

Sumac is a formal network of 15 museums, art galleries, archives, and historic sites in Simcoe County. While the group has worked together on an informal basis since 1996, the establishment of Sumac now unites the group formally in a spirit of future cooperation as it works to promote the cultural institutions of Simcoe County.

Who makes up the current Sumac membership?

The Sumac network includes the Simcoe County Museum, Huronia Museum, Penetanguishene Centennial Museum & Archives, Base Borden Museum, Collingwood Museum, Leacock Museum National Historic Site, Orillia Museum of Art and History, Ontario Provincial Police Museum, Coldwater Canadiana Museum, Museum on the Boyne, Simcoe County Archives, MacLaren Art Centre, Nancy Island Historic Site, Sainte-Marie among the Hurons, and Discovery Harbour.

Why a new name?

In December of 2009, a Strategic Marketing Plan was completed for the group. As the group moves forward, this marketing plan will be implemented over the next five years. It is also anticipated that the network will function as an advocate in representing its membership of 15 cultural institutions in Simcoe County. While an older moniker served the group in its early years, it was felt that a new brand and title would be beneficial for both the implementation of the Marketing Plan and the group's advocacy efforts.

What does Sumac mean?

The title Sumac is not an acronym, but was chosen for the following reasons:

- * Sumac can be interpreted as the "Sum of Arts and Culture" in Simcoe County
- * Red sumac is a heritage plant found throughout Simcoe County and nicely reflects the common cooperation across the network's members. The red plant species also works effectively as a supportive graphic to this title.
- * The descriptive text "Simcoe County's Cultural Network" will also be used in association with the new title Sumac

How is Sumac funded?

The Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Ontario Ministry of Culture has provided initial seed money to complete the 5 Year Strategic Marketing Plan. Further funding for implementation of the Plan is supported by the Ontario Trillium Foundation on the condition that Sumac members also contribute financially to the project each year for the five year period. Members' contributions are based on a sliding scale depending on the size and marketing budget of the individual museum, art gallery, archives, or historic site.

How is Sumac governed?

Currently Sumac is managed by an internal Management Committee and has hired a part-time Project Manager to implement the Five Year Strategic Marketing Plan. Regular all-member meetings are also held on an ongoing basis throughout the year.

Sumac is currently applying for not-forprofit status in association with the Ontario Historical Society (OHS). When this is

granted, Sumac will move to a Board governance model and appoint a Board of Directors to manage the affairs of the organization, in compliance with all requirements relative to this model and those required by the OHS. It is anticipated this step will be completed by June 2011.

What is the status of Marketing Plan implementation?

Currently Sumac is working through the first key steps in the "Year 1" module of the marketing plan. These have included the development of the new name Sumac, its associated brand and graphic treatment, the community Media launch on May 3 at the MacLaren Art Centre in Barrie, and the launch of a website flashpage with links to membership web sites. Future tasks for 2011 will be the development of a full featured Sumac website that provides increased profile for each member plus additional special features, a new "Summer Fun" marketing initiative with the Simcoe County Board of Education, and selected advertising in key venues to draw attention to the Sumac network and its membership.

What other activities is Sumac currently involved in?

As Sumac formalizes it is anticipated that the group will be an effective voice and link for its membership relative to key tourism and cultural initiatives. Currently Sumac has had representation at the Provincial RTO7 input meetings for regional tourism marketing, has attended a War of 1812 Anniversary committee meeting for general information sharing, and monitors additional linkage and stakeholder opportunities.

Who is the primary contact person for Sumac?

Sumac currently maintains a part-time Project Manager to coordinate the implementation of its Five Year Marketing Plan, and to function as a communications liaison for the group and its internal Management committee. General inquiries can be directed to:

One of the newest Historical Societies in Simcoe County is the Allandale Railway Historical Society.

This not-for-profit group formed in January of 2011 to encourage the preservation of the Barrie area's railway history and to promote appreciation for, and an understanding of, its contribution to the economic development of the City. The society is interested in playing a leadership role in assisting in the establishment of a railway museum to be located in old rail lands area, ideally in the restored Allandale Station.

Their president, Mitchell Wilson, states that the group is still setting up infrastructure. In June, the group hosted a tent at Celebrate Barrie, offering guided tours through out the day, information on the ongoing restoration of the train station, rail artifacts, photo boards, and a slide show.
