If that signifies spring, nature misread the message because now as I write it's as cold as it has been all winter, and we have more snow cover too than most of the winter.

Since we last met in the fall, Ron and I enjoyed trips to Egypt to check out that history and cruise on the Nile before Christmas, and since then travelled to Chile, Argentina, and the Amazon Basin on an agricultural tour. Now I

Two years ago it was 12 feet higher. And the rain every day, sometimes very heavy, convinced me we were in a rain forest.

The new bird feeding complex (ask me what it's like) Ron and our son created has many visitors but not the variety of some years.

I look forward to seeing you again at the museum on March 20.



On Saturday January 14th 2012, the 14th annual John A Macdonald dinner was held in Orillia. Again, under the aegis of the Orillia Museum of Art and History (OMAH), a sold out crowd was treated to an excellent evening with guest speaker former Ontario Premier Ernie Eves, who was not only entertaining and funny, but also very well informed regarding John A.'s huge contribution to Canadian history. Ernie Eves was Premier from 2001 to 2003 and was elected eight times to the provincial legislature. He served a total of twenty-four years. He received a standing ovation at the conclusion of his talk.

very pleased by the festive and fun nature of the evening on this his 197th birthday. We are all looking forward, not only to next year's evening, but also to the bi-centennial celebrations in 2015.

History of the Carley One-Room Schoolhouse

Carley is a rural community that came into being in Oro-Medonte Township when the Canadian Pacific Railway constructed a line from Toronto to Sudbury in 1907.

The CPR built a station, water tower and residence on what is now the Warminster Side Road (near line 7) to refuel steam engines and to serve local farm families. The CPR named the station "Carley" after a local family. (Initially the community was called Booth Corners but one of James and Emily Booth's daughters had married a Captain Carley and the CPR selected the Carley name). Additional station facilities included a stock yard, weigh scales and granary which allowed farmers to ship hogs and cattle to market. The granary was also used as the community dance hall.

A real community developed around the railway station. Within a few years local farm families had their own post office, and a sports field, including a winter ice rink. Telephones were installed in 1911, and Carley gossip appeared regularly in the Orillia newspaper. A general store, boarding house and brickworks followed by the 1920s.

In 1911 the community decided to construct a school. The McDuff Bros. of nearby Coulson built the foundation for the one-room schoolhouse out of concrete, using their state of the art cement machine, and the Booth Bros. (Art and Bob) did the carpentry work. The school opened in 1912 with Miss Maud Bell of Carley as the first teacher. She taught 20 pupils in Grades 1 through 8.

This little school quickly became the social centre of the community.

Carley did not have its own church, and the school was used by traveling associations for religious meetings. It was also the site of Sunday school and school picnics. Large crowds attended these gatherings which included races, games, a luncheon and sometimes ice cream. The school grounds were also used for sporting activities, including baseball, basketball and football.



In 1939 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (the Queen Mother) toured Canada. When the Royal Train stopped in Carley to take on water, hundreds of people were there to welcome the royal couple.

By the late 1930s, Carley and many other rural communities were in decline as people left the farms for the city. Cars and better roads lessened reliance on the railway, and in 1951 formal passenger service at Carley Station ceased (although informal service lasted several more years). Freight shipments continued, however, until diesel engines made water stops unnecessary. The station was closed finally in 1960 and torn down, including the water tank and all other buildings on the station

grounds. Today, there is no sign the station ever existed.

Carley school closed in 1965, a victim of a provincial policy of school consolidation which resulted in the closure of one room schools across the province. The final class of 15 students was taught by Robert Ritchie. The school became a community hall immediately thereafter where many events, including family reunions, wedding receptions, card parties, craft shows, pancake breakfasts, tea rooms and square dances continue to be held.

The Carley schoolhouse is the last visible connection to the community's past. There is no sign of the railway station and the store and boarding house are now private homes. Further, Carley no longer appears on maps.

A dedicated group of Community Hall Board members and volunteers has worked hard to keep the Carley Community Hall, now owned by the Township of Oro-Medonte as a viable and functioning entity. In the last few years it became evident that the Hall required some major repairs if it was to continue. After nearly 100 years there were problems with the foundation, the furnace had been "condemned" so that the Hall couldn't be used in the winter and the original windows needed to be replaced with modern energy efficient windows.

In late 2011 the Hall was the recipient of an Ontario Trillium Foundation Grant of \$105,900, obtained under the auspices of the Eady-Grenard Women's Institute. This will allow all the necessary repairs to be addressed and will then permit the Hall to be used 12 months

of the year. Work is scheduled to commence in the spring of this year.

At the same time the repairs are occurring, the Community Hall Board and the volunteers are working on the plans for the Hall's centennial celebration (1912-2012) scheduled for August 18th of this year. Attempts are being made to contact former students of the school and their families to be a part of the celebration on August 18th. It promises to be a very special and memorable occasion.

The Andrew Hunter Award 2012

The Andrew Hunter Award is offered annually for historical research on Simcoe County, Ontario, written by an undergraduate student for a course in any university or college. In this eighth year of competition, we look



forward to receiving many worthy entries for each of the two awards being offered.

Conditions: The entry shall be an essay between 3,000 and 5,000 words in length or a fourth year undergraduate thesis paper (no length restriction) on some aspect of the history of Simcoe County, Ontario, written in English or in French. The author must have been a part-time or full-time undergraduate student in a degree program at an accredited university or college at the time of writing. The essay must have been written to meet the requirement of an undergraduate credit course during the 2011-2012 academic year. The thesis paper must have been submitted

for grading in the 2010-2011 academic year. Entries become the property of the Simcoe County Historical Association and may be published as part of an essay collection.

Submissions: Essay entries shall be postmarked by April 9, 2012 and undergraduate theses shall be postmarked by January 30, 2012. Submissions will not be returned to the contestants. Papers must be typed in Times New Roman 12 point font, double spaced, and should not bear the instructor's comments or grade. Three copies must be provided. A cover sheet must list the author's name, address, phone number, year of study, school affiliation and department, and the name of the instructor for whom the paper was written.

Adjudication: Entries will be judged by a distinguished panel appointed by the Simcoe County Historical Association. The winners will be announced in early May 2012 with the presentation of the awards to take place at the Annual General Meeting of the Association.

Award: There will be two awards offered in Canadian funds, one for \$500 for the best undergraduate essay and one for \$500 for the best undergraduate thesis. The Simcoe County Historical Association may edit the winning entries for the purpose of publication.
