President's Report by Ted Duncan

Our last *News and Views* helped to connect people with an interest in history in our County.

I spoke at a Tiny Township Heritage Meeting in Balm Beach on October 22. This was a constructive meeting, allowing me to find out about the interesting things they are doing and for me to talk about what we at SCHA are looking at doing. There is no society or association in that township, but they are one of our members.

The SCHA presented the Beattie Farm and Distillery our Heritage Business Award in recognition of their decades of service to the development of Simcoe County on October 5. The presentation took place at the Beattie Farm distillery just outside Alliston. More than 70 people, including family and friends, were there. The County and the Town of New Tecumseth were represented by the Mayor of the Town, Rick Milne. He spoke of the long service that the Beattie family has provided to the people of the area over many years: a well-deserved family business in the County to be honoured by our recognition Award. On October 23, the CTV station did a segment on the presentation to the Beattie family.

Huronia Woodlands Association held their AGM in Elmvale on November 9. I went to the meeting to hear Cathy Walton speak about her new book *Vanishing Barns* in Vespera-Springwater. I took the opportunity to talk about SCHA and what we are doing and make connections with a number of people there who are interested in history.

SCHA, in partnership with the

Barrie Legion, sponsored speaker Evelyn Ross of Orillia at the Legion November 13. She told the story of her parents' escape from Nazi occupied Holland. Leaving in 1942, it took two years for them to reach North America. Evelyn's mother kept a diary of the journey, but left the names of people and places out in case they were caught by the Nazis. After reaching Canada, she completed it from memory. It was a very touching story with much of it told in her mother's words by Evelyn as she read from her mother's diary. It was a poignant reminder of why we sent young men and women to fight the Nazis in WWII and why we honour their service every year on November 11.

I took part in three meetings of the Truth & Reconciliation Circle in Orillia this fall. We are discussing how the indigenous community and the wider general community can interact and work better together now and in the future despite the past. We are hoping to bring more young people into the Circle. It's not going to be easy, but we all need to keep talking and be of good will.

Our County Board of Directors continues to work updating SCHA Policies and Constitution. We are looking at becoming more involved with the County Heritage Fair hosted by the Simcoe County Museum in the spring. SCHA has been involved with the recording of our history through the written word in the past, and so we are looking at promoting history writing in our high schools.

Special thanks to Donna Wice and Deb Crawford for doing a great job organizing the Beattie Presentation. Dedicated Board members Deb Exel, Mark Fisher, Jan Blommaert and John Merritt continue to work hard for History in our County. County of Simcoe announces new historic lookout by John Merritt

In October, the County of Simcoe announced that it has begun revitalizing a former landfill site on George Johnston Road in Springwater.

The site, now named Wiidookdaadiwin (an Ojibway word meaning "working together and helping one another"), will become a regional heritage attraction that features a historic lookout with vistas stretching from Collingwood to Mount St. Louis Moonstone. The historically significant Minesing Wetlands, Fort Willow historic site, and Nine Mile Portage route will also be visible.

Wiidookdaadiwin will also become the new home of a bronze sculpture of the same name, created by renowned local sculptor Marlene Hilton Moore and financed in part by Heritage Canada. The sculpture portrays a First Nations man and a European traveler pausing together mid-portage. The First Nations man shields his eyes to look into the distance while the European man balances a birch bark canoe on his shoulders. The sculpture is currently on display in front of the Simcoe County Museum but will be well suited in its new home, overlooking the historic transportation route linking the upper

Policy meant to utilize surplus farm houses has unintended consequences for heritage barns by John Merritt

Ontario Barn Preservation wants to know what your municipality does with surplus farm dwellings.

Surplus farm dwelling severance is a planning policy that was enacted several years ago to address an old policy that allowed farmers to expand their farmland by purchasing former farms and letting the old farmhouses fall into ruin rather than bother with renting them out.

The province introduced the surplus farm dwelling policy to allow these unused farm houses to be severed from the rest of the property and rezoned as residential. Since the policy was first enacted three years ago, these small severed lots have appeared all over rural Ontario.

However, this policy which seeks to prevent old farm houses from going to waste comes with a negative side-effect: farm buildings on either the newly severed lot or in the agricultural land around it must be demolished in order to create a buffer between the new residential property and farming activity on the lands surrounding it. Due to this, the new policy has decimated the stock of heritage barns in many parts of the province.

Recognizing this negative effect of the severance policy, many municipalities have begun reviewing it. Ontario Barn Preservation, a not-for-profit group dedicated to preserving and promoting Ontario's heritage barns, is taking this opportunity to convince municipalities of the value of preserving heritage farm buildings. The Association argues that due to their age, old heritage barns are unlikely to be used by their new owners on the large farms and would be more beneficial to be included in the severed residential lots, whose

residents would be more inclined to use and preserve the buildings. The Association also argues that the rezoning designation should be changed to allow the farm buildings on and around newly severed lots to remain standing.

The Ontario Barns Association encourages readers of this article to speak to their local government and find out what the policy is in your area regarding surplus farm dwelling severances. Then, share your local policy with Ontario Barns, and maybe it will help them discover alternative policies that they pass on to other municipalities across Ontario to address this issue and preserve more of our heritage barns.


